PART 3(2) - RESPONSIBILITY FOR COUNCIL FUNCTIONS

LICENSING COMMITTEE – TERMS OF REFERENCE

- (1) The full Committee shall comprise 11 Councillors appointed by the Council at its annual meeting, including a Chairman and Vice-Chairman.
- (2) For the functions set out in Annex 1, and the legislation listed in Annex 2, a Sub-Committee consisting of no more than any three Councillors drawn, in alphabetical order, from the members of the full Committee shall be formed. Any such Sub-Committee shall elect a Chairman on an ad-hoc basis.
- (3) For the transaction of business at full Committee meetings, the quorum shall be a minimum of five Committee members save that no business shall be transacted unless either the Chairman or Vice-Chairman of the Committee is present.
- (4) The Committee and Sub-Committees shall have full authority to hear and determine licensing applications.
- (5) The Committee and Sub-Committees shall be further empowered to determine appeals made against the decisions of the Head of Environmental Services taken under delegated authority on licensing applications.
- (6) The Committee shall at all times carry out its duties solely within the policy from time to time determined by the Council and shall conduct its proceedings in accordance with the requirements set out in Annex 3 (Conduct of Business by Licensing Committee and Sub-Committees).
- (7) The Licensing Committee shall take no part in the production or revision of the statement of licensing policy made under Section 5 of the Licensing Act 2003, however, they may determine policy under the legislation listed in Annex 3.

PART A – CONDUCT OF BUSINESS BY LICENSING COMMITTEE AND SUB-COMMITTEES

All references to committee in this annex shall be taken to infer a reference to the associated sub-committees.

1. General Conduct

- 1.1 All hearings of the Licensing Committee under the Licensing Act 2003, are to be held in accordance with the Personal Licences, Hearings, Premises Licences and Club Premises Certificates, and Licensing Register Regulations, made under the Licensing Act 2003.
- 1.2 The Council's Constitution shall regulate the conduct of and debate at meetings.
- 1.3 In the case of hearings under the Licensing Act 2003, the Committee shall only consider those matters relevant to the licensing objectives as set out in the Licensing Act 2003 and the statement of licensing policy adopted by the Council.

2. Declarations of Interest

2.1 Members of the Committee are subject to the Council's Code of Conduct and to advice from the Standard Board for England, details of which will be provided to those members.

3. Participation in the Hearing

- 3.1 Debate shall be restricted to members of the Licensing Committee. Where a local ward member, not being a member of the Committee, wishes to participate in the hearing, they may do so only with the permission of the Chairman and their participation shall be subject to the same rules as are applied to any other witnesses to the application.
- 3.2 In hearings other than those under the Licensing Act 2003, where a ward member is a member of the Committee, and wishes to object to the application, the member shall give 14 days' notice of their intention, and shall play no part in the decision-making process of the Committee. In hearings under the Licensing Act 2003, those named as responsible authorities and interested parties in the Act may only make representations within the time limits set out in the relevant statutory provisions.
- 3.3 All persons participating in the hearing shall be made aware of the limitations or scope of statements that will be acceptable and, in particular, that statements should be factual or a fair statement on a matter of public interest.

4. Attendance of the Public

4.1 The Council's Constitution and relevant statutory provisions relating to the admission or exclusion of the public shall apply to all meetings of the Licensing Committee.

5. Natural Justice

5.1 There are two elements to natural justice:

(a) Fairness

- (i) All persons affected by the decision or in the case of matters associated with the Licensing Act 2003, those named as responsible authorities and interested parties in the Act, will be allowed a hearing before a decision is made.
- (ii) Only objectors who can show clearly that they are affected by a decision shall be afforded the right to be heard or, in the case of hearings under the Licensing Act 2003, only those named in the Act as responsible authorities or interested parties.
- (iii) All information shall be made available, where possible in advance, to the applicant and the Committee.
- (iv) All members of the Committee shall be present throughout the hearing of a particular application. Where a member arrives late or leaves during a hearing of a particular application, that member shall play no part in the decision-making process. Where an application is adjourned it shall be continued by the same members only, and no others.
- (v) The Committee shall have discretion in respect of 'late' objections. Such objections shall be clearly marked on the agenda as such and the Committee shall decide on their acceptability. The applicant shall be advised of any late objections. In the case of representations made in relation to the Licensing Act 2003 applications, these shall only be accepted in accordance with the relevant statutory provisions.

(b) Prevention of Bias

- (i) The rules on the declarations of interest shall be firmly applied.
- (ii) If the Committee moves into private session to consider its decision, it shall be accompanied only by its advising officers, none of whom shall have taken a substantive part in the hearing, and shall play no substantive part in the decision-making process.

6. General Procedures for Hearings

- 6.1 The following procedural requirements shall be followed at all times:
 - (a) There shall be no recommendation from officers on the agenda;
 - (b) The Committee shall be supplied with copies of all relevant documentation and the process and order of procedure shall be as follows:
 - (i) The Chairman will open the meeting and introduce persons as appropriate asking applicants and representatives to identify themselves.
 - (ii) The Chairman will outline the procedure to be followed.

- (iii) The Lead Officer will outline the matter in hand.
- (iv) The applicant or representative will present his/her case, with or without witnesses, and be questioned by members or any objectors/persons making representations present.
- (v) Any objectors/persons making representations may then present their objections/representation, with or without witnesses, and be questioned by members or the applicant/s or their representative.
- (vi) The objectors/persons making representations may make a final statement (without introducing new issues).
- (vii) Finally, the applicant has the right to make a final statement (without introducing new issues).
- (viii) All evidence/disclosures are to be made in the presence of all persons, unless someone voluntarily excuses themselves from the proceedings.
- (ix) Committee members shall restrict themselves to questions and not discussion or comment.
- (x) The applicant, objectors/persons making representations shall be allowed to ask officers questions of a technical/factual nature at any time during the proceedings.
- (xi) An adjournment should be granted where to do otherwise would deny a fair hearing.
- (xii) The Committee may resolve to decide upon the application in private session, however, if it becomes necessary to recall anyone for additional information, everyone shall be invited to return to the Hearing.
- (xiii) The decision shall be given in the presence of all parties that wish to be present and confirmed in writing as soon as possible thereafter. If legal advice is given to members this advice will be repeated in summary form.

We have recently been informed that Morrison's Supermarket have applied to the Council for extended opening hours and for the variation of the Premises Licence to sell alcohol during these new opening times.

As residents of The Drive, Loughton, whose property backs onto the Supermarket's car park, we would like to inform you of our strong objection to this application. We are concerned for the following reasons: -

- Additional noise disturbance increasing the opening hours will not only mean that customers will be
 arriving early in the morning and leaving late at night but also that staff will be arriving even earlier
 than 6am, to prepare to open the store and leaving later than 11pm, after closing up. Additional
 opening hours may also require extra deliveries (going against the original planning permission for the



I write on behalf of Loughton Methodist Church to oppose Morrison's application for extended licensing hours. Our objections are three fold.

1. Protection of children from harm.

Although Morrison's would not sell alcohol to underage young people they will sell it as a 'loss leader' to adults and this encourages a drinking culture. Alcohol abuse sets a poor example to children even if they are not actually physically harmed. Sadly alcohol abuse breeds domestic violence both on the street and in the home. We are opposed to this application because it flies in the face of government concern that cheap supermarket alcohol is linked to huge domestic issues where children are often the most vulnerable victims. Almost adjacent to Morrison's is the shop 'Cakes & Shakes' which is open in the evenings and is very popular with young people. If Morrison's was to open up to 11pm each evening it could easily attract the young people to also drink alcohol.

2. Prevention of crime and disorder and public safety.

We are also concerned that young people will find ways of acquiring alcohol from places that sell it without actually buying it themselves. This would have real implications for public safety.

In recent years Loughton has had significant problems of young people congregating on the High Road. Through the hard work of the local police, St. Mary's 'ignite' youth activities, The Space and Epping Forest Youth for Christ our High Road is now a much less intimidating place in the evenings with no large groups of teenagers roaming around. Any increase in drinking on the streets would lead to the perception of street crime. This is particularly relevant for senior citizens for whom perceptions of an aggressive street culture will limit their willingness to go out in the evening. We fear that increased licensing hours would ultimately be calculated in a less safe and secure High Road environment.

3. Prevention of public nuisance

Loughton High Road is home to a large number of people in flats above shops and they currently face weekend disorder that includes late night noise, rowdism, street fighting, cans and bottles on the pavement and people vomiting. We believe that extended licensing hours can only exacerbate these problems. Finally, the church is only a few yards away from the supermarket and the proposed opening hours would adversely affect those who are attending our Alcoholics Anonymous groups and courageously seeking to "kick the habit".

In conclusion we believe that there is no need for these additional licensing opening hours in Loughton. There are other shops already fulfilling this need elsewhere but away from the centre of the town.

We are not opposed to alcohol consumption, but as with much of the country we are very concerned with its adverse effects. We assert that increased licensing hours can only have a detrimental impact upon Loughton's town centre. We are particularly anxious about the potential impact upon the quality of life for some youth and children.

We urge the Licensing Panel not to grant this license.

As someone who lives in the Drive and whose garden is quite close to the boundary of the car park for Morrisons, I would very strongly object to any further extension of the opening hours and most especially the alcohol licence; my reasons are as follows:-

When I first moved here, some 20 years ago now, the boundary of the then Fine Fare was some distance from my garden. As a result of the purchase by Fine Fare(as it was at that time) of most of the houses at the bottom end of the Drive -which had extremely long gardens- the car park area and eventual Store size was greatly increased. This brought the boundary much closer to a number of houses. It also effected the traffic into the Drive, most particularly because of the very large container lorries.

At present with the hours of 8 a.m to 8 p.m. Monday to Saturday, and 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. Sundays, there is already a lot of motor noise, crashing of trolleys, car alarms - which regularly go off whilst their owners are in the store. During the summer, sitting and trying to enjoy your garden can be quite a noisy, unappealing situation. This has become much worse since Epping Forest lost the appeal against the increased size of the store and car-park.

These houses and the ones in the adjacent roads were here long before the Supermarket - and its'now greatly increased size. It is essentially a residential area and any extended trading hours will be very much to the detriment of those who live in the vicinity.

The other issue, that of variation of the licence to extend the hours in order to sell alcohol, is a recipe for disaster - given that there is no off-licence in the centre of Loughton - the already considerable problems in the High Road with what can only be described as very anti-social behaviour. As a resident whose garden is a very short distance from the car park and back of the store, I view with dread the distinct possibility that this would become an area (very difficult to police) used by groups in the same way they use other areas near the Station, and in the High Road, except any escape route might be over our garden fences!

I sincerely hope that this application is rejected since there appears to be no proper justification for such an expansion of hours - other of course than sheer profit.

Hi Nicola;

I live down Habgood Road and today in the post we got a home made hand delivered letter (organised by one of the neighbors) calling for support in trying to reject the local Morrisons' application for longer hours, with liquor license. I personally would encourage the authorities here to approve the application.

There have been countless times where I've forgotten things, and just wished the supermarket was open that bit longer. Personally, I think longer hours at the supermarket will benefit all concerned - the flexibility of the longer service for customers, a little more employment for the people wishing to working the hours, etc.

Regarding the liquor licensing, I hardly think Loughton has much to be concerned about. I've lived here (within a minute or two's walking distance from Morrisons, and the high street) a year now, and I've never seen alcoholics congregating there, and neither have I seen evidence suggesting that the supermarket is any more or less responsible than the clubs down the far end of high street. Loughton seems to be an affluent area, where locals appear to have a high stanard of schooling, parents are quite concened.

I used to live in Germany where they only recently have started relaxed Sunday trading laws. Compared to my native New Zealand where we've had 24hr Supermarkets for quite some time, this certainly seemed prehistoric. Dear Madam.

I would like to register my objections to the planning application submitted by the Morrisons Supermarket chain to extend the opening hours of the store in the High Road Loughton. I also wish to object to the application for variation of the licence to sell alcohol.

As a resident of the Drive living in close proximity to the store I am already frequently inconvenienced by the volume of traffic in and out of the supermarket car park. The road marking on the car park exit road which, should give priority to traffic travelling up and down the Drive are ignored by motorists leaving the supermarket. I have personally had one minor accident when someone exiting the car park drove out and into the back of my car.

The close proximity of the exit from the supermarket car park and the entrance and exit from the adjacent council car park frequently cause traffic jams back into the High Road. Cars trying to turn into the council car park are often prevented from entering by cars exiting the Morrisons car park pulling out and stopping across the council car park entrance, The fact that there is a "Keep Clear" box sign on the road at this point seems to be an irrelevance to most drivers. It is a common occurrence that cars stop across the pavement whilst waiting for the lights at the end of the drive to change, in the belief that they will then be able to force there way out into the drive traffic. Unless police are stationed at these points all the time during supermarket opening hours I see little prospect of the road markings or the highway code being observed.

Extended opening hours must bring increased sales or there is no business case for doing it, this in turn means extra deliveries. The large articulated lorries which are currently used already add to the problems of traffic flow since they are frequently stuck in a queue trying to enter the supermarket car park and then completely block the drive. HGVs also often arrive two at a time and one then has to wait on the car park access road whilst the first one is unloaded.


To extend the opening hours further and subject the residents of The Drive, Habgood and Woodland Roads to further inconvenience will make our lives intolerable we already have to allow extra time when driving out just to get clear of the Drive and into the High road.

To then sell alcohol during extended hours will simply add to late night problems of hooliganism in the surrounding roads. We hear government and doctors' talk of alcohol abuse and cheap alcohol from supermarkets as a serious problem.

A supermarket selling alcohol 19 hours a day doesn't seem to be in tune with what our administrators and health professionals are telling us.

I do not believe the Morrisons organisation seriously expect to get approval for what they have proposed but have cynically submitted these outrageous proposals in the expectation that if they are turned down they will get a lesser extension on appeal. I sincerely hope that they do not succeed with this ploy.

I am a resident of Woodland Road, in the vicinity of the commercial premises described above. I am writing to register my objection to Morrisons' application. My reasons are as follows:

There is no proven need for the supermarket to be open from 6am. There is no proven need for it to be selling alcohol during these extended hours and this may cause a nuisance and encourage street drinking. Young people already gather in the late evening in the car park adjacent to Morrisons' car park in the drive - if the licence is extended until the late evening, there is a likelihood that they will stay later and drink longer, causing difficulties for local residents. I work late shifts and on my way home, towards midnight, frequently pass groups of youths that are customers of Cakes and Shakes or the fried chicken shop on the high road. While this has not been a difficulty to me, it can be intimidating. These youths are apparently not drinking, but I fear with more opportunity to purchase alcohol nearby, they might. Woodland Road, where I live, is two streets behind Morrisons. The road is already a free parking spot for the High Road and among

those who use it as such are Morrisons' staff. If the shop opens at 6am we will doubtless be woken by the slamming of car doors and the sound of car radios in the early hours. As it is, this does not usually start until some time just before 8am. I would also add that the road is used for the school run for Staples Road school so there are already parking issues in Woodland Road. Doubtless Habgood Road and the Drive would have the same problem. I therefore object to the application on the grounds of:The prevention of disorderThe protection of minors from harmPublic safetyStopping noise and nuisance in a residential area.




I am writing to register my objection to the current application by Morrisons in Loughton to extend their licensing hours and, by implication, their opening hours.

Morrisons do not allow their staff to park in the supermarket car park which already creates issues for the residents in the local area. I am frequently woken at 3.45am by their bakery staff parking in The Drive before starting a 4am shift. If the entire store was to open at 6am there would increased disruption from many more members of staff parking in the very early hours of the morning and leaving late at night.

I am also concerned by the impact of longer opening hours on deliveries to the supermarket at unsocial hours. There is disruption for residents even under the current restrictions. For example, the delivery vehicle for Warburtons does not enter the supermarket carpark prior to making a delivery, but reverses from The Drive into Morrisons entrance. This results in the constant beep of the reversing alarm at 6.30am in the morning which disrupts sleep for local residents.

Finally, there are never more than a few customers in the supermarket at the current opening and closing times, and I do not believe that there is a community need for earlier or later opening hours.




Application to extend opening hours by Morrisons Supermarket



COCERNING MORRISON'S LOUGHTON APPLICATION TO VARY THEIR HOURS OF BUSINESS AND EXTEND THE HOURS FOR THE SALE OF LIQUOR

I have strenuous objections to the current proposals to vary Morrison's supermarket in Loughton's conditions of sale.

The first two applications, namely that opening hours should be extended to 6.00am - 11.00pm. from Monday - Sunday, and that the sale of alcohol be permitted during these extended hours, are to be taken together.

It is well known that young people under 16 have little problem in obtaining alcohol if they want it. Friends, relatives or family are usually on-hand, somewhere, sometime to get them their cheap beer, cheap super-strength cider, or even harder drink. Therefore:

- 1. If Morrison's is going to be open AND selling liquor until 11.00pm every night of the week, the store is going to become a Mecca for these young people, or their agents.
- 2. Given that liquor may be purchased until late at night it is highly likely, particularly during the months of daylight saving, that it will be consumed by young people in the streets around Loughton.
- 3. If young people are consuming liquor in the streets and public places, they will not be under any adult supervision, hence the possibility of anti-social or even criminal behaviour is enhanced.
- 4. Given the constant rise in under-age drinking, and the associated rise in under-age alcohol-induced hospital admissions, it is incumbent on any licensing authority to make the most strenuous efforts in order that this situation not be made worse than it already is.
- 5. Allowing Morrison's of Loughton to sell liquor until late every night of the week constitutes a direct attack on the principle of curbing

under-age drinking, and for that matter, the binge drinking of those of a legal age to purchase alcohol. The Commission would do well to bear in mind the report in yesterday's medical journal *The Lancet*, which asserts that alcohol in the UK does more harm than heroin and crack cocaine combined.

I am not a Christian, nevertheless I am appalled at the manner in which days that are meant to be "holy", meant to be days of reflection and quiet have been transformed by so many businesses into the crassest and lowest forms of commercialism, just another opportunity to flog merchandise and make profits. If Loughton were a predominantly Muslim or Jewish area there might then be an argument for opening Morrison's on Christmas Day and Good Friday: it is not. No argument regarding this aspect of multi-cultural Britain can be mounted in regard to this area. Morrison's is applying initially to sell alcohol on 363 days of the year. Now it wants to grab the last two, supposedly the most special in the calendar of the greatest number of Britons. If Morrison's is so desperate to grab the last remaining days the year, there can only be two conclusions. They are that, any self-serving claims to the contrary, as a major corporate business in the UK, it has consciously adopted a policy where:

- a) any concern for the effects of alcohol drinking on young and old alike is abandoned and
- b) the profit motive is the only thing that drives this business: no other considerations matter. In particular the health, social and spiritual welfare of the community are quite evidently set at nought.





I refer to an application made under the Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 1982 regarding the above mentioned application that I received on 22 October 2010.

I would like to make the following representations with regard to the matter, in order to minimise a pest issue and to help prevent littering:

A sufficient number of suitable receptacles with properly fitted covers shall be provided for the purpose of receiving rubbish from customers. The receptacles shall be maintained in a clean condition and emptied on a daily basis, or the receptacles shall be constructed, maintained and located so that access to them by vermin is prevented and arrangements shall be made for the regular lawful disposal of their contents. Specifications and positioning of the receptacles shall be agreed in writing with the Local Authority before the hereby permitted consent is carried out.

The public area immediately surrounding the premises shall be cleared of waste food, food containers, wrapping etc. at the end of trading on each day. Such refuse shall be removed from the area and disposed of lawfully. The cleaning regime shall be agreed in writing with the Local Authority before the hereby permitted consent is carried out.

Signs shall be placed in a prominent position while the burger van is trading, requesting customers to use the litterbins that have been provided for any waste food, food containers and other litter.


