

EFDC Safer Spaces Commonplace report 30 November 2020



Engagement

The EFDC Safer Spaces during COVID-19 commonplace platform launched on the 13 June 2020. Up to 30 November there were 5,410 visitors. An increase of 485 since 9 November.

Total contributions are now at 795. They are made up of 242 comments and 553 agreements. 116 people have subscribed to receive the project news by email.


Of the 331 respondents, 202 confirmed their email address to be genuine and are public. There are 35 comments and 114 agreements from 129 unconfirmed respondents which are not public.



What is the problem?

When asked 'What is the problem?' The top 5 issues are:

1. Fast traffic - 97
2. Bad driving – 70
3. Not enough space for social distancing – 69
4. Volume of traffic – 65
5. Pavement parking - 45

How could we make it better?

When asked 'How could we make it better?' The top 5 improvements are:

1. Slow down traffic - 84
2. Reduce speed limit - 67
3. More space for walking - 42
4. Restrict vehicle access - 41
5. Keep the pavement clear – 34

Actions

Collaboration and funding

Epping Forest District Council is working with Essex County Council Highways Authority, to propose and install some key interventions to enable social distancing and better active travel. The comments on Commonplace are helping to shape proposals that the District Council is discussing with the County Council. We are continuing to review funding opportunities for social distancing, revitalising the local economy and reopening high streets safely. Epping Forest District Council is also reporting an overview of comments to Local Councillors, to ensure that the voices of those commenting are being heard by decision-makers in their area.

High Street works

Improvements to Sun Street, Waltham Abbey and Epping High Street are currently being undertaken by the District Council's new Highway Rangers service. Uneven paving slabs have been re-laid to reduce trip hazards and make walking to local shops more accessible. Railings, signposts, streetlights and bench seats are being repaired and repainted. These works are intended to make the high streets more accessible and attractive to encourage people of all ages and abilities to feel safe and secure when getting to their local shops by foot or by bike.

Essex County Council Highways team and their engineers will also be undertaking works in December, installing retractable bollards in Epping High Street, to ensure that the high street remains functional, attractive and allows for social distancing.

Environmental Health Officers

Comments on Commonplace relating to social distancing concerns within specific premises or groups of premises continue to be relayed to the Council's Environmental Health Officers to take action where possible. The Council's EHO's will be ensuring that the new rules for premises for the tiered system are being applied from 2nd December; these will be consistently applied across Essex.

Further Actions

Some of the comments which are not exclusively to do with social distancing should be reported direct to the relevant body to action. These include:

Roads and pavements



What is your age group?






What is your normal mode of transport?

If you have a car, how do you expect the amount you drive it to change in the coming months compared with your pre-Covid use?




40% drive it less

41% air quality is better


24% I haven't noticed a difference
